Philadelphia Ledger. In re-establishing the Philippine courts General Otis has done wisely in letting the proceedings continue to be, as heretofore, in he Spanish language, notwithstanding the efforts of newcomers to induce him to order that the English language shall be used. The Filipinos are accustomed to the Spanish language, they do not understand English and to hold court proceedings in an unknown tongue would not only be a travesty on justice, but would increase the distrust in which the natives now hold the Americans, and which it is one of Otis' prime objects to remove. The American authorities in Cuba have erred in trying to change native manners and customs too arbitrarily and the mistake should not be repeated in the Philippines.

Signs of Prosperity. Boston Post. The announcement is made by the depart-

nent at Washington that the regrading of ostoffices this year, which is made to take ffect on July 1, will show a greater number of increases in salary than ever before. The pay of postmasters below the highest grade is determined by the amount of business done at their respective offices. A considerable elevation in grade, therefore, shows a marked increase in the use of the mails by the public. This is confirmed by figures of the receipts of the department to date, which show an increase of about \$15,000,000 from the average of recent years. There is sure sign of prosperity in all this. When the first consignment was ex-amined by the censor he offered the importer the alternative of returning the soap to England or removing the obnoxious label. It appears from a report published in the Hamburger Nachrichten that a society has been formed in Denmark to counteract the German societies by assisting Danish farmers who are in difficulties and tempted to abandon their holdings, and by helping others to secure vacant farms on easy terms. The subscriptions already published amount to 2,500,000 kroner, of which 1,000,000 kroner have been given by M. Jacobsen, a wealthy brewer in Copenhagen. The comment which the Nachrichten makes upon this is that the Prussian diet will have to vote a larger sum for its "colonizing" work in its next budget. GOLD SHIPMENT TO EUROPE

Does Not Occasion Any Alarm in the Financial World-Can Easily Be Spared.

NEW YORK, June 2 .- The Journal and Advertiser says the announcement that the National City bank would ship \$1,000,000 in gold to Europe on the steamship Lucania was considerable of a surprise in Wall street. Although sterling exchange has ruled rather high, it has been maintained by bankers that there was little likelihood of any gold exports at the present time. 
