Recently the State department issued a circular to our diplomatic and consular officials, in relation to the matter of protection of residents of Cuba and Porto Rico within their jurisdiction.

It is presumed to be the purpose of these instructions to prevent any action by our ambassadors or consuls that might be deemed to force a recognition of the status of Porto Rico in anticipation of action of congress defining it.
