

FLIES AT HIM WITH A KNIFE

Violent Attack by a Discharged Man Upon H. G. Leavitt at Fremont.

PROMPT HELP AVERTS A FATALITY

Peter Boyd, the Man with the Knife, is Arrested and Will Be Tried in County Court Today.

FREMONT, Neb., July 11.—(Special Telegram.)—Haywood G. Leavitt, president of the Standard Beet Sugar company, had a narrow escape from being stabbed to death near the factory last night by a man by the name of Peter Boyd, alias Peterson.

Manager Peterson reported the case to Mr. Leavitt, who discharged him and another man who was mixed up in the trouble, ordering them to leave the premises.

While the fracas was going on Leavitt noticed that Boyd was striking at his right side just above the hip and for the first time was aware that the man had a knife. He has a scar on his right arm and leg just above the hip and a long scratch on the right side of his neck.

GOOD GROWING WEATHER

Wheat Harvest Has Commenced in Nebraska and Corn is in Tassel.

UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA, Lincoln, July 11.—The past week has been cool, with heavy rains in southern counties.

The rest of the week has been below normal in the northern and most of the extreme western counties and heavy in the southern counties.

The season has been an excellent one for the growth of vegetation in all parts of the state. Winter wheat has ripened rapidly and harvesting has commenced.

Corn has continued to grow rapidly and is now too large for cultivation, except in northern counties. Corn is laid by fairly free of weeds, but more cultivating would have been done had it grown less rapidly.

ONEILL LAND OFFICE REPORT

Receipts During Last Year Show an Increase Over Previous Year.

ONEILL, Neb., July 11.—(Special.)—The O'Neill land office officials have just completed their annual report for the fiscal year ending July 1. The report shows that receipts during the year were \$45,849.66.

On July 1 there were 754,000 acres of government land in the district. This land is located in the counties of Brown, Boyd, Boone, Rock, Holt, Knox, Antelope, Garfield, Loup, Wheeler and Keya Paha.

Land Commissioner J. V. Wolfe is in the city today offering school lands for sale. Great interest is being taken in the sale and the land is bringing all its worth.

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NEWS GLEANED IN LINCOLN

Items of Interest Picked Up in a Day in Nebraska's Capital City.

LINCOLN, Neb., July 11.—(Special.)

The regents of the state university will meet in the main building of the state university tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The Lincoln Tennis association will hold a tournament open to all tennis players of the state in the latter part of the present month. A number of prizes have already been offered.

Alexander Schaefer, who recently went from this city to San Juan, Ponce de Leon, to accept the position of examiner of customs, has been promoted to the post of deputy auditor of customs at that place.

The Commercial Land company, with a capital stock of \$100,000, and the Omaha Gas Light company, with a capital of \$5,000, both of Omaha, have filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state.

Chairman L. C. Pace of the local reunion committee, has issued the following circular concerning the reunion of the Grand Army of the Republic, which will be held in this city September 11 to 15.

The committees having the arrangements for the reunion in charge are anticipating an immense gathering. There are about 2,500 veterans in the Grand Army of the Republic in Lincoln, and thousands who will come to the reunion to see the "Fighting First," which has been honored with a reception and a parade.

The pure food commission opened its office on the third floor of the state capitol building today. The commission has had some difficulty about getting stationary and other supplies, as the printing board has not yet advertised for bids on the work.

ASSYRIAN LAD LOST AT SEA

Missing Passenger Could Not Be Found When Ship Was Abandoned.

TOPMAST OF PORTIA ALL THAT IS VISIBLE

Passengers and Crew Take to the Boats with Much Difficulty, Owing to the Heavy Swell—Survivors Lose Everything.

HALIFAX, N. S., July 11.—The steamer Portia, which struck on Big Fish shoal fifteen miles out of Halifax last night, floated and sank during the night.

Reports received this morning from Sambro Island, where the passengers and crew were landed, indicate the only victim of the wreck was a 12-year-old Assyrian lad known by the name of Basha, who was traveling second-class from New York to St. John's, N. B., where his mother lives.

The accounts of the wreck which reached here last evening indicated that the passengers were saved in comparative ease, but later reports show that the work was not accomplished without considerable difficulty.

He ordered the boats to be made ready at once. This was done and the passengers, including about thirty women, filled them without confusion, although the dangerous swell added peril to the proceeding.

Search for Missing Lad. The shipwrecked men and women all were landed on Sambro island, which was hardly two miles from the place where the steamer lay. They were cared for there during the night, although the accommodations were meager.
