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MINING IN THE BLACK HILLS

No Truth in Rumor that Homestake Mine Will Be Concocted by the Rothschilds. LEAD, S. D., July 23.—(Special.)—The Homestake company on July 13 increased its capital stock from \$12,500,000 to \$12,000,000 for the purpose of purchasing the stock of the Highland Mining company, the Black Hills Canal and Water company, the Black Hills and Fort Pierre Railway company. The consolidation was effected in order that the one management might conduct the affairs of all companies with greater facility.

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The Highland Mining company, which is now a part of the Homestake company, has paid nearly \$1,000,000 in dividends and there is also a great body of ore in sight which will last for a good many years yet. The Homestake company is employing about 1,200 men and about 2,800 tons of ore are being treated per day which averages about \$4 per ton of gold.

Developments in Custer County. A Colorado company is reported as having purchased the old Alexander stamp mill, in Custer county. It is the intention to put in a system of Willey concentrators and experiment with the mill on several of the best concentrating ores in the district. The mines of Custer county contain free gold on the surface but in a depth of thirty to fifty feet. A number of attempts have been made in years past to treat the ore by amalgamation, but in nearly every instance the test has proven a failure. The ore is either a cyaniding or chlorinating proposition or possibly a concentrating process will handle it. The county is rich in quartz veins, which carry ore in all grades of richness. A large part of the ore is in a condition, which requires very careful assaying to get the full values.

There are a dozen or more separate mining districts in the county in which are to be found quartz veins of ore which range from ten to 25 feet in width. The deep shafts in the county are not more than 200 feet and they show at that depth that the ore bodies are invariably true verticals.

Gumbot Returns with Interesting Souvenirs of a Two Thousand-Mile Trip Up the Amazon. WASHINGTON, July 23.—The Navy department has made public the report recently made by Commander C. C. Todd of the Wilmington relating to the cruise of that vessel up the Amazon. The Wilmington proceeded 2,300 miles up the river, investigated the topography and natural resources of the country, made a collection of animals for the zoological park in Washington and secured a series of photographs of the towns along the river, the natives and the country in general. The report includes reports from his subordinate officers, who were entrusted with special investigations.

The treatment of the United States vessel and its officers by the Peruvian authorities was courteous throughout, although at one point in the Peruvian section of the upper Amazon a whole military post composed of six men, led to the bush on the appearance of a man-of-war, and it was with difficulty that the two men could be induced to return home. The report also states that the Wilmington official sanction to proceed up the river to Iquitos. This city was the farthest point reached by the Wilmington on its long inland voyage, although it might have proceeded about 400 miles farther had there been a supply of coal obtained.

The animals secured by the Wilmington for the National zoo at Washington include a two-toed sloth, a peccary, three small ground hogs, a South American tapir, a gray eagle, one tiger cat, a macaw, two deadhead monkeys, one night monkey and one howling monkey, one macaco monkey and a number of parrots.

Thirty-Eight Governors Respond. ST. LOUIS, July 23.—A special to the Republic from Austin, Tex., states that Governor Sayers had received thirty-eight replies to his invitations to the governors and attorney generals of the several states to attend the conference on the conservation of public lands at the World's Fair in St. Louis on September 20.

Those who have expressed their intention to attend the meeting are: Governor McMillen of Tennessee, Governor G. W. Whitcomb of Alabama, Governor Murphy of Arizona, Governor John R. Tanner of Illinois, Governor Smith of Montana, Governor F. B. Pancher of North Dakota, Governor W. A. Poyner of Nebraska, the governor of Oregon, A. D. Chandler of Georgia and Governor Samuel Lowndes of Maryland.

A dozen governors write they will attend the conference if they can get away from their official duties.
