Political issues seem to enter into the trial of ex-Policeman Inda for murder. At least that is the charge made by City Attorney Connell, who represents the defend-Mr. Connell says County Attorney Shields is simply making a "grand stand play" for political effect, and before the end of the trial it is said that that theory will be more prominently brought out. Mr. Connell was vigorous in making his opening statement to the jury, and County Attorney Shields also talked in a spirited manner. The case will be sharply contested, and it promises to be one of the most interesting murder trials Omaha has known for a long

Dr. William Purnell, one of the physicians called at the time of Smith's death, testified that he believed the injury was caused by some kind of a sharp instrument. His testimony did not coincide with that of Dr. Davis. Dr. Ralph followed Dr. Purnell. His opinion was substantially the same as that of Dr. Davis. Only three three witnesses were examined during the day and Dr. Raiph had not yet concluded when court adjourned. He will be recalled this morning for further inquiry.

Merscheim-Arriens Case Nearing End. Testimony in the Merscheim-Arriens damage suit for alienation of a wife's affections was resumed in Judge Slabaugh's division of the district court yesterday. 




