CITY WARRANTS CALLED IN

Outstanding Obligations to Amount of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars Will Be Discharged.

The city treasurer has begun publication announcing the retirement of city warrants to the amount of \$25,000 which will be taken up at this time. The warrants include Nos. 5850 to 5938 in the fire fund, representing for the most part salaries of firemen; Nos. 5939 to 5979 in the police fund, also representing salaries; Nos. 3414 to 3526 in the general fund; Nos. 829 to 877 in the park fund and Nos. 673 to 674 in the lighting fund. None of the school warrants will be called in until further funds are made available by the payment of liquor licenses, which will occur from this time until the end of the year, and will bring in a revenue of about \$240,000. There are now about \$100,000 in outstanding warrants against the school fund and the November and December pay rolls will increase this amount by \$70,000.
