to Cables-Business Mostly in the Hands of Professionsls.

CHICAGO, Nov. 22.-Wheat was firm early with Liverpool, but weakened on liberal receipts and a report of a large shipment from Duluth to this port, closing 15% %c under yesterday. Corn, influenced heavy clearances and Interruption of the movement, closed 1/21/4c higher for December and May unchanged. Oats closed unchanged and provisions 21gc lower. Wheat failed to hold its own. The opening, December at 67%@67%c and May at 115671%c, was at a gain of %3%c over yesterday's close. Cables were higher and to this the early strength was mainly attributable. Business was mostly in the hands of professionals and changing of December and May contracts, which made up a large proportion of trades, was within a range of 4c, as was all other business in wheat,

proportion of trades, was within a range of %c, as was all other business in wheat. Around opening figures the market fluctua-ted narrowly for half the session, then it weakened and there was considerable liqui-dation of both December and May. A report that Duluth had boats loaded with 250,000 bushels for this port was a fac-tor in the weakeness. December sold down to fixe and May to 71%71%c: December closed %6%c lower at 65%657c and May, under yesterday's final figures, at 71%c. Primary receipts were 749.549 bushels, com-pared with 1.076.155 last year; northwest re-ceipts were 654 cars, against 681 last week and 328 a year ago. The northwest 1898 re-ceipts were forty-seven cars, nineteen of contract grade. New York reported twenty-five loads taken for export. Atlantic and Guif port clearances in wheat and flour were equal to 539,000 bushels. Corn was steady. Rains continued in the growing belt and cables were higher, facts which encouraged purchasers to take in all offerings at figures a bit over yesterday's closing prices. Clearances were enormous -1,000.000 bushels; receipts were full cars here and country offerings were small. The cash demand was poor.
