Peck Confers with McKinley. WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Perdian Peck, commissioner general to the Paris exposition and a brigadier general, was in the city this afternoon and left immediately for Chicago. The steamer Prairie will leave Baltimore and Norfolk next week for France, carrying the first shipment of the government exhibit, and will return in January, after another shipment.

Month's Work at the Mint. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 30.—The total coinage at the mint during November was \$3,046,070, which represents 19,415,210 silver coins. Of the gold coins, to the value of \$1,067,530, there were 167,439 eagles, 99,506 half eagles and 1,529 quarter eagles. In silver there was a total of \$1,978,540 coined, 1,142,000 being half dollar pieces, 1,508,000 quarters and 2,370,000 dimes. The month's coinage of nickels was valued at \$141,500, while 11,387,000 pennies were made.
