ABLE TO CONTROL THE PLAGUE

Honolulu Authorities Take Prompt Action—Not Seriously Alarmed.

San Francisco, Dec. 29.—Mail address from Honolulu to the Associated Press regarding the bubonic plague situation says: President Dole, while realizing the seriousness of the situation, does not believe there is much cause for alarm.

The council of state met in extraordinary session on December 12 and appropriated \$25,000 for immediate use of the Board of Health in combating the plague.

All of the districts outside of Honolulu are in a clean condition and there is little danger that the plague will gain a foothold in the other islands.

General Wyman in referring to the dispatch, said he did not consider the situation critical in any respect. He said also that Honolulu had a competent board of health.
