HANNA IS TO BE CHAIRMAN

Cleveland Paper Says It Has It from the Best of Authorities Senator Will Secede.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 2.—According to the Cleveland Leader, information received by a source second only to President McKinley, Senator Hanna is to be elected chairman of the next republican national committee, but will be both temporary and permanent chairman of the republican national convention. This statement may perhaps be explained upon the hypothesis that such is the expressed wish of President McKinley and that the president being the only candidate before the convention for the office he holds the delegates will cheerfully acquiesce. The statement is made that the only question which has ever existed as to the continuation of Senator Hanna's leadership in the coming campaign was that regarding his willingness. He has now announced his willingness to undertake the task next year and the president's wish in that respect is to be gratified.

COUNCIL DEFIES INJUNCTION

Trains on the Nickel Plate road are using the tracks of the Lake Shore between Brockton and Buffalo. Lake Shore trains are getting through, but are about two hours late. Traffic over several street routes is blocked. In many places the snow is six feet deep on a level.
