The report shows by a footnote in the supplementary statement that upon all three properties during 1898-99 the sum of \$1,926,000 was expended at the cost earnings for permanent improvements and equipment.

An excess of current assets over curren and accrued liabilities amounting to \$1.-109,000 is shown in the balance sheet. Among the liabilities stands the sum of \$1. 500,000, set apart for the dividend on the preferred stock that was paid in October. Considering this amount as a current liability, for which cash in hand must be allotted in order to meet it, a net floating debt of approximately \$400,000 appears.





The new cor-poration took possession of the main line on February 1 and of the Kansas Pacific lines on April 1, 1898. During the last eighteen months the Omaha & Republican Valley roads, the Julesburg district and some other branches have been taken in and the Oregon Short Line and the Oregon Railroad and Navigation virtually have been consolidated with the Union Pacific. In less than two years, accordingly, with gov ernment hands off and a practical capitalization, the company has developed from a beginning with nothing to a point at which it is earning 4 per cent on \$100,000,000 of preferred stock and toward 5 per cent on nearly another \$100,000,000 of common stock, after putting very large amounts of surplus earnings into permanent improve-ments. With these conditions existing at present, a considerable measure of adversity might apparently be encountered without risk to the company's interest obligations, or even to the preferred stock dividends.


