The meeting, which was held in the city council chamber, was well attended, much interest being displayed in the discussion, and a number of spirited talks were made by the members.

The discussion was led by Prof. W. One prooses a system of parole for criminals of nsound mind or who are apparently irreponsible for their acts. The bill in brief provides that any district judge who has sentenced a prisoner to not more than five years in the state penitentiary, and has reason to believe the prisoner's mind is unsound or he was otherwise irresponsible for his acts, may suspend the sentence diocese. The decision to divide the arch against him after the prisoner has given bond for \$1,000, and investigate his case. If the judge is finally convinced that his convictions are correct he may, upon statement of the governor, further suspend his sentence or place him under parole upon the issuance of another bond of the same amount as the first. This is the first measure bearing upon the subject of parole which has yet come before the assembly, though Governor Shaw recommended a system of state parole in his message this year.


