There is the same uncertainty in cotton goods as in retail distribution, with quite as much doubt whether prices will be maintained, though the material has again been advanced a sixteenth in speculation flut exports in March were in value \$3,968,78, a gain over last year of \$21,25,858, so rapidly has Europe supplied its needs.

This enormous gain made exports of the chief staples \$18,80,831 greater in value than in March of last year, though decrease occurred in other items. Yet only a fraction of the gain was cotton shipments from New York, leaving the other great increase here to be explained by manufactured exports mainly. In spite of the heavy balance due on merchandise account there has been talk of gold exports and a small amount has gone to Buenos Ayres on European account. Supplies of money are abundant here, the banks having again gained largely, rates are low and commercial demands narrow and the interior is better prepared than ever to do without ald.

The exports of wheat from both coasts continue larger than last year, though much of the gain is at Pacific ports, not directly affecting Atlantic supplies.


