MAY LOWER PREIGHT TARIFFS

Western Trunk Line Committee Will Consider Proposed Reductions, The serenity that has prevailed in freight circles for weeks past promises to be some what disturbed in the next few days. The Western Trunk Line committee, the membership of which is composed of the freight officials of western lines, meets in Chicago Wednesday. The revision of certain exist. ing tariffs will be considered, although nothing of particular moment is on the docket for discussion. Of the more important mat-

Among other questions to be considered is a proposition to apply the third class rate en candy and confectionery in less than carload quantities. At present the second class rate is effective and if the officials decide to change to the third class a lower tariff will become operative.

An identical proposition is made relative to shipments of binding twine and agricul turale implements in less than carload quantities. The present tariff is the secondordinary interest to local shippers, owing to the increased shipments of agricultural implements into all parts of Nebraska at the present time. During the last thirty days and costs, which he paid. some remarkably targe shipments have been made, especially to the country south of the Platte river. As an indication of the demand for agricultural machinery, showing the material prosperity existing in the state, may be cited a special freight train of twenty-five cars, all loaded with threshing machines from Racine, Wis., which was recently hauled by the Burlington to Lincoln for distribution from there to various points in the state. The long train made a daylight run from Plattsmouth to Omaha and from Omaha to Lincoln, attracting considerable attention along the route.


