As it is now this city is compelled to work under a charter the same as Beatrice, Hastings, Kearney, etc. The city officials of these towns declined ings and business too large and important a year or so ago to allow a change in the present charter. This year it is proposed to secure a ceparate charter for South Omaha. If it is done a larger levy for fire and police purposee will be made and radical changes in the regulations covering the removal of garbage will be made. Mayor Kelly wants to give to the people the right to haul their own garbage, provided they comply with the laws. He also wants to have the hauling of garbage for public departments placed on a competitive basis. More than this, he favors a reduction of the price now paid for the carting away of dead animals. The mayor thinks that if the council folwill permit. lows his recommendations a great deal of money will be saved to the taxpayers every year by a reduction of prices. At the same

time better service will be given. For a long time the city garbagemaster has used a dump on the river front, where the city is compelled to pay for the use of the same. It is figured that the city can well afford to secure a dump for itself and thus save a monthly rental, or else have the refuse hauled to LaPlatte in cars th same as is done with the stock yards refuse.
