## London Gold Shipments.

NEW YORK, May 15.—The National City bank and Lazard Freres will both send gold to Paris this week, but their aggregate shipments, unless increased by tomorrow's negotiations, will not exceed \$1.000,000. Other firms may send \$1,000,000 additional, bringing the total shipments by La Gascogne in the neighborhood of \$2.000,000.
