CHICAGO, May B.-Damage claims from France and sympathy with corn sustained wheat today in the face of rain in the northwest, July closing 122 4c over yester day. July corn closed 50% up and July pats a shade improved. Provisions closed steady and practically unchanged.

In this way most of the wheat sold early was repurchased and July rallied to 57½c, closing firm at ½6½c over yesterday at 57967½c. The strength developed by corn was also a support. DECIDES BANKRUPTCY CASES Supreme Court Rules on the Jurisdiction of District Courts.

WASHINGTON, May 29.-The supreme court before adjourning decided several cases involving the question of jurisliction of the United States district courts under the present bankruptcy law.

The decisions in all cases were handed down by Justice Gray. In one case, that of Bardes against the Hawarden (Ia.) First National bank, the court held in reply to questions certified by the United States district judges for that district. 1. The provisions of the second clause of section 23 of the bankrupt act of 1898 con-trol and limit the jurisdiction of all caurts, including the several district courts of the United States, over suits brought by trus-United States, over suits brought by trustees in bankruptcy to recover or collect debts due from third parties, or to set aside transfers of property to third parties, alleged to be fraudulent as against creditors, including payments in money or property to preferred creditors.

2. The district court of the United States, by the proposed defendant's consent, but not otherwise, entertain jurisdiction over suits brought by trustees in bankruptcy to set aside fraudulent transfers of money or property made by the bankrupt to third parties before the institution of proceedings in bankruptcy.

3. The district court for the northern district of Iowa cannot take jurisdiction over this suit as it now stands on the record.

In the case of W. A. Hicks, from the circuit court of appeals for the Sixth circuit, the court held that a district court has jurisdiction by the consent of the proposed defendant, but not otherwise, to maintain a bill in equity filed by a trustee in bankruptcy appointed by it, against a fraudulent grantee or transferrence of the bankrupt resident in this district, to recover the property belonging to the estate of the bankrupt and by him fraudulently conveyed to the defendant. In the case of C. M. White, from the Seventh circuit, "the district court, sitting in bankruptcy, had jurisdiction by summary proceeding to compel the return of property selzed and after an adjudication an action of replevin in a state court cannot be commenced and maintained against the bankrupt to cover property in the possession of and claimed by the bankrupt at the time of that adjudication, and in the possession of a

Thousands Going Abroad. WASHINGTON, May 29.-The State deparament has issued over 3,000 passports to European travelers for the twenty-eight days in May. It is said that the climax has been reached and from this point on the issues will diminish. As it is, the figures show a gain of over 50 per cent above the normal passport issues for May. The figures for April were 3.064, a gain of more than 100 per cent over the normal business. Most of these travelers are going to Paris, yet it is said at the State deprament that during the last portion of the first quarter of 1990 and that part of the second quarter which has already elapsed there has been an unusually large number of applications for passports from American merchants and commercial travelers bound abroad on business.


