London sold about as many stocks in this market as were bought for that account vesterday and dragged prices below last night's level. The Steel stocks, after fractional advances, turned heavy on the news of the closing down of additional mills and offered no support to the market for the rest of the day. Sugar hung below hast night's prices all day. In fact, the strength in the Tobacco stocks was the only notable element of strength in the industrial departments.
