SOUTH OMAHA NEWS.

All members of the Board of Education were present at the meeting held last night and there was a good crowd in witness of the official acts of the city representatives.

The principal business transacted was the selection of new teachers and the action of the board in deciding to choose a site for a ward building until further investigation.

Chairman Bolla of the buildings and grounds committee submitted a report recommending the purchase of either of two sites, one the Foster site at Twenty-third and K streets, and the other the O'Neil site at the southwest corner of O'Neil and K streets.

The report called attention to the fact that either of these sites was desirable for ward building purposes as a reason that the school district needs a site for a building for grade purposes. And that it will also soon need a site for a high school building.

Therefore, the O'Neil site for \$2,000 would give temporary relief to a much crowded district and it would be prudent to purchase it. The objection was raised, however, that it is too small. In reporting further the committee recommended that a good plan would be to purchase the site with a view of erecting a building for temporary relief and later connecting it with a main building which could be used for a high school. As a location for such buildings, the committee recommended the Foster site.

In a word, the report recommended the O'Neil site is preferable for a ward building for temporary relief, but in the event that one or more such buildings could be later attached to a high school building the Foster site is favored. It was asserted by members of the board that the Foster site at \$2,000 is favorable considered for a high school and ward school site. The report of the committee was placed on file.
