The market for wheat opened strong, July %401%c over yesterday at 704070%c. This was because of heavy rains in the south and southwest and because early reports showed that the northwest during the previous twenty-four hours had but little rain. There was a big business done the first hour, mainly between 73%c and The crop reports from the territory which has absorbed attention recently were not materially changed from their gloomy tenor. A reaction was started by the weather bureau prediction of rains in Minnesota and the Dakotas. Later Aberdeen, S. D., wired that rain was falling there. Longs sold heavily, the northwest following the local lead, and July gradually declined to 73%. The close was weak, July colone to 72%473c. New York reported 44 loads taken at the seaboard for export. Clearances in wheat and flour were equal to 245,090 bu. Primary receipts were 611,000 bu., compared with 734,000 bu. last year. Certainly there was no heavy liquidation pressing upon the market today, Sales were quite inappreciable, which were made for any other account than that of small room traders, who would eagerly close a contract if they saw a profit of 's or 's in the change of price.
