The matter came up when Chairman Miller of the license ommittee read a report recommending that licenses be granted to about eighty applicants. When Mr. Miller had completed the reading of his lengthy report Mayor Kelly then took occasion to make a few remarks on the subject of issuing licenses. This is what the mayor said:

I declare this report of the license com-mittee our of order by reason of its con-flicting with an ordinance now in force, which prohibits the granting of liquor liwhich prohibits the granting of liquor licenses to firms, corporations or associations or the issuing of more than one license to any individual.

If it is intended to grant licenses legally
steps should first be taken to repeal the ordinance referred to. Numerous compolaints
are being made to me daily about saleons
being allowed to run without licenses. Although the applicants have advertised in
good faith and paid into the city treasury
the sum of \$700 each, there is no protection
to the city on the bonds given by these appilicants for the reason that as long as
there is no license there is no bond, the
latter being a portion of the license. This,
in my opinion, is a very important matter
and I believe the complaints are well
founded.

In this connection I wish to state that unless this license question is unraveled at the next meeting of the council I shall deem it my duty to close every saloon in the city pending the granting of licenses. The officials of the city have been very lenient in handling the liquor question. Good legal authority assures me that under our charter the council is without authority to attractive assures me that under our char-ter the council is without authority to grant licenses for less than \$1,000, and upon the completion of the United States census there will be no question about the amount required by law. 
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
