

CITY CANPURCHASE SWEEPER

Judge Keyser Denies Union's Request for an Injunction.

TERM "DAY LABOR" DEFINED BY COURT

Words Held to Be a Prohibition of Contract Labor and Not Necessarily Meaning "Hand Labor."

The pneumatic street sweeper has the approval of the law; the hum of its wheels and suction draught will continue to be heard on the streets of Omaha in spite of the protest of Federal Union No. 8921.

"In 1887 the original city charter was granted to Omaha," said Judge Keyser, "and in it there were provisions regarding the cleaning of streets. An option was left with the officials whether the work should be done by contract or by day's labor."

"In the charter passed in 1897 the rule is laid down that 'no sweeping must be done by day's labor.' This would imply that the old provision for contract labor is no longer valid and that the work must be done by the day rather than through the medium of some contractor who might have little regard for the welfare of his men."

"In the new charter there is a parallel case with regard to paving. Such work is to be let by contract unless otherwise provided for by taxpayers. It is held that the use of machinery in this country is so general," concluded the court, "it has become such a necessity in every department of human activity that no court would be justified in denying the city the use of modern appliances unless a serious objection would be made by taxpayers of the city, but that the only effect would be to sweep five times as much surface. Judge Keyser also spoke of the city's objection on the ground of the union not being a taxpayer. He said that the point would be a serious one, but that both sides had signified their desire to have the case decided on its merits."

Martin-Cott Hat Company Will Be Ready for Business About January 1.

Another important business enterprise has joined Omaha's gathering caravan of progress. George Cott, William Cott and Frank Martin, all of this city, and a young man named Helmer, who is connected with a prominent Sioux City business establishment, have associated themselves in the organization of the Martin-Cott Hat company, which will shortly incorporate with a capital stock of \$50,000. The company has secured the building at 1107 Harney street, the occupant of which will remove to the old Kirkendall building, now occupied as a warehouse by M. E. Smith & Co., at Eleventh and Harney streets. The company expects to get its affairs in shape for business by January 1 and will at that time put six or seven men on the road.
