Judge Keysor Denies Union's Request for an Injunction.

TERM "DAY LABOR" DEFINED BY COURT

Words Held to Be a Prohibition o Contract Labor and Not Necessarily Meaning "Hand Labor."

Judge Keysor denied the union's petition for a temporary injunction yesterday and gave the city permission to make the first payment of \$1.250 on the Furnas sweeper

recently purchased. "In 1887 the original city charter was granted to Omaha," said Judge Keysor, and in it there were provisions regarding the cleaning of streets. An option was left with the officials whether the work should be done by contract or by day's labor. The street commissioner was given oversight over the sweeping and in case the labor was done by contract it was specified that he should appoint an overseer.

In the charter passed in 1897 the rule is laid down that 'all sweeping must be done by day's labor.' This would imply that the old provision for contract labor is no longer valid and that the work must be done by the day rather than through the medium of some contractor who might have little re-


