Wheat is Lively Compared to Dullness of Recent Sessions.

MARKET SCORES ADVANCE ALL AROUND

.CHICAGO, Aug. 7.-The day's grains markets were again greatly influenced by weather conditions here and abroad. Wheat closed at an advance of \$47%c, the factor being the sharp advance at Liverpool oc-casioned by the wet weather in England Corn advanced %/25c, influenced by the hot winds, which are playing havor with the crop. At the opening in wheat and for a few minutes after an exceedingly lively bustness was done, compared with the almost utter stagnation of recent sessions. quotations from Liverpool furnished a big surprise to local traders, showing an adsurprise to local traders, showing an advance in that market of 1\(^4\)\mathbb{m}\) and the devance was said to be due to exceptionally had weather all over the United Kingdom, greatly interfering with harvesting operations. Opening quotations in September ranged from about \(^4\)\text{c} to a full cent over yesterday's closing prices, the range being from 76\(^4\)\text{c} to 76\(^4\)\text{c}. But there the advance stopped and it took but a few minutes of the heavy realizing which started at once to force prices back quite materially. There were apparently plenty of buying orders on the market at fice and under and the market was not often allowed to go below that figure up to the noon hour, the lowest point touched up to that time being 75%. The world's visible supply increased 1,476,000 bushels, according to Bradstreet's, about what the trade had been looking for. New York reported export engagements of eighty loads. Seaboard clearances of wheat and flour were put at 275,000 bushels.

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Corn was dull for the most part, but firm at all times. The market opened strong and higher on the continued hot weather in the west, which was reported to be doing great damage to the crop. Offerings at no time were heavy and the market easily absorbed them. Country acceptances were light and the shipping demand good. Receipts were 310 cars. September ranged from 38%c to 38%g38%c and closed %g3%c higher at 38%g38%c, and closed %g3%c.

Oats were quiet, but steady at a small advance over yesterday, traders being influenced principally by the strength developed in ether grain markets. A feature was the entire absence of country selling and most of the buying orders were from that source. Receipts were heavy, 718 cars. Frovisions were steady with a fair general trade, with packers the best buyers. There was some outside demand, presumably influenced by the government demands for meats. There were no new disturbing developments as regards the yellow fever outbreak. The cash demand was excellent and had considerable influence on trading.
