CORN IS FIRM AND ENDS SESSION HIGHER

Oats Are Quiet with but Little Life-Provisions Dull with Inexpected Weakness Developing to Lard During Day.

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.-September wheat forced down by liquidation, closed \$227ac loc lower today. Corn closed to higher and oats the down. Provisions were irregular, pork closing 35c lower, lard 5974c depressed and ribs unchanged.

Wheat opened weak, unchanged to 2140 lower; September at 73%@73%c. A ray of bullishness was extracted from lighter Argentine shipments and the fact that Liver-pool showed less decline than there was here yesterday. September, following the opening, advanced to 72%, but failed to hold it. The habit of liquidation had a hold on local traders, as well as on some out-Ride people. Western receipts were smaller, too, but the seiling continued in a dreary way, the cash demand being slack, the pit only half filled and September gradually declined to 73% and closed weak, % 9% cunder yesterday at 72% 67%. The only feature of the dreary session was the lack of speculation. Clearances in wheat and flour at the scaboard were equal to 170,090 bushels. Primary receipts aggregated 825,090 bushels, compared with 520,090 last year. Minneapolis and Duluth reported 185 cars, against 225 last week and 212 a year ago.
