CATTLE—There was a fairly liberal run of cattle here today, receipts being composed largely of westerns. The demand for choice steers on the part of both packers and speculators was in good shape, so that the market on those grades was active and the market on those grades was active and stronger.

There were only about twenty cars of corn cattle on sale today and packers all seemed to want those of good quality. The market was steady to strong and fairly active, as high as \$5.80 being paid for a bunch of well bred westerns weighing 1.586 pounds. The common grades were not sought after and the market on that class was no more than steady.

The cow market was not in very good shape today. Packers did not seem very anxious for fresh supplies and the tendency was toward lower prices. Some of the best grades may have brought right around steady prices, but the medium grades were siow and about a dime lower. It was a draggy market from start to finish and it was late before anything like a clearance was made.
