DIFFERING OPINIONS

Officials of the Internal Revenue Department Seem to Be at Variance with One Another.

An order involving the liability of the manufacturers of certain flour products to the payment of interval revenue has been received by the collector of internal revquiry of an Omaha house as to its liability. This house manufactures a flour known as "self-raising." Its formula shows that it contains wheat flour, cornmeal, sait and leavening. The comm the war revenue act the basis of "mixed flour" must be wheat flour and not corn-

meal, as in this case. In this connection there is a difference of opinion in departmental circles at Washington, of which none of the officials in Omaha will speak. Some time ago a Nebraska house paid internal revenue tax upon mixed flour as a product somewhat similar to the one in question, with the exception that the base of their compound was wheat flour. In the course of time an opinion of the commissioner was received to the effect that this flour did not come within the terms of the act, and the company not only ceased to pay the tax, but ent to the department a claim for a refund of the money previously paid. commissioner allowed the claim and the government appealed to the comptroller who reversed the decision of the commissioner and refused to refund the money. With this condition of affairs the Nebraska product goes on the market without the stemp, but the money paid cannot be re-

covered. Required Age of Naval Recentts. CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—The United States naval recruiting station nere has received an order from the Bureau of Navigation, Washington, changing the age requirement for landsmen from "21 to 25," instead of "18 to 25," years, as heretofore.
