

steel rails should be less than \$25 a tou." An official of the Carnegie Steel company had this to say: 200

"According to press dispatches dissemi nated throughout the country the Carnegie 4:0 Steel company at its recent meeting at Pittsburg were announced as having de-

cided to sustain the full price of \$16 for ralls. This was said to have been brought about by information to the effect that at a recent conference of railroad officials in this city the railroads had decided not to 175 pay more than \$22. The facts as shown in this dispatch were not only found to be without foundation, but we are in possession of definite information to the effect

that such a course antagonistic to the railroad interests is against the announced policy of the Carnegie Steel company. "On the contrary, the purpose of the com-

pany is to sell its products,, as heretofore announced by Mr. Carnegie himself, at a fair profit to the manufacturer, the company not being obliged by reason of its capital to take any question of dividence. on watered stock into account in fixing such \$12.079 prices."
