

CAPITAL OF STATE MAKES POOR SHOWING

Results Attained in Most Districts Indicate That There Need Be No Fear of Apathy and That Repullcan Voters Are Awake.

DES MOINES, Oct. 26 .- (Special Telegram.)-Reports from all over the state of registration indicate a very heavy vote in nearly all sections. 


