Portland Company Starts Its New Cyanide Plant at Central City.

RAGGED TOP BECOMES ACTIVE AGAIN

Operations Resumed There on the Large Blanket Deposits-Outlook for a Customs Cyanide Plant is Flattering.

DEADWOOD, S. D., Oct. 28.-(Special.)-The Portland Mining company of Clinton, ia., has started up its new fifty-ton cyanide and the ore will be shipped to it from the company's mines at Portland. The Wasp company has erected its plant in the Yellow creek district, four miles south of Dead-These plants make eleven cyanide works now in successful operation in Lawrence county. The process of cyaniding ores in the different camps in the county has been thoroughly tested now and it has been proven a success in every particular. J. K. Vanatta and Henry Wattson of Colorado Springs, Colo., officers of the Spearfish Mining and Reduction company, left this

week for their home, to be gone a few days. Their company is erecting the largest crushing cyanide plant in the Black Hills, with a daily capacity of 200 tons. The mill will e ready to receive ore November 10. Mr. watching the success of our plant. If our quarter in length. company successfully treats the ore in our mine there will be a company of mining men as ours, which will do just as we have done in erecting a cyanide plant. We are sure in operation a short distance from our new mill which has been making big profits for over a year on our kind of ore. The mass of mining men in the United States have now given up looking for the very rich gold mines, and attention is being paid to the big uniform in value, which can be figured upon for years ahead. It is better to make a profit of only 50 cents per ton every day in the year than it is to make a much larger sum only part of the time. The Black Hills are full of these big low grade propositions. When worked upon a large scale, say 200 to 500 tons per day, they are the greatest kind

Operations at Ragged Top. The Spearfish plant is being erected a Ragged Top, eleven miles west of this city, in the limestone formation. The ore is found in great blankets, which cover the ground in all directions to a depth of ten to forty feet. Since the company began operating the ground several new chutes of ore have been uncovered, which are rich in gold values. The plant can be enlarged to 500 tons daily capacity without much additional expense. The Ragged Top district is about five miles good many propositions open just as good as that of this company. The general average of the ore is about \$10 per ton gold, with some silver, and it is expected that the total cost of mining and treating

the ore will not exceed \$2.25 per ton. There has been a need of a custom cyanide and chlorinating plant in Deadwood and vicinity for some time. The new plant will be the finest in the Black Hills, costing about \$100,000.

About every so often there is a rumor affoat that the Crosby-Echrich syndicate of Colorado Springs will commence work on the development of the group of claims at Kirk, four miles south of this city. The company has held a bond on the ground for nearly two years, complying with all of the requirements of the bond.
