# FAST MAIL TRAIN TO WEST

Burlington Will Put on Rapid Service from record of the students of the International Chicago to Billings.

ST. PAUL-FORTLAND TRAIN DISCONT:NUED

Northern Pacific Contracts Its Service and Coust Mail from the East Will Now Pass Through Sebruska.

Another fast mail train from Chicago to the Missouri river will be put into service next Sunday, when the Burlington will begin the operation of a train designed primarily for the purpose of carrying the bulk of mail matter destined to Montana and the northwest. Hereinfore all mail matter originating in Chicago and the east directed to points in the northwest has been handled by way of St. Paul, and thence west over the Northern Pacific. This line has been enabled to handle the mail to good advantage by reason of having a double daily service from St. Paul to Portland.

It has been deemed advisable by the Northern Pacific, however, to discontinue one of its St. Paul-Portland trains, because of the slackening of business during the winter months. This action was further considered the part of wisdom for the reason that the Burlington has a through train from Chicago and St. Louis to Billings, and thence west to Portland over the Northern

The friendly relations existing between the Burlington and the Northern Pacific and the close traffic agreement that has been decided upon made it a business proposition of value to let the Burlington handle a portion of the mail and passenger traffic from operating it through to Portland. By so doing the running of a train over the North- Frank A. Decker, Council Bluffs, Iowa .. 91 ern Pacific from St. Paul to Billings is entirely obviated.

The new mail train on the Burlington will leave Chicago in the morning at 8:50, arriving at Lincoln in the evening at 11 F. B. Holbrook, 1108 Harney street.... 60 p'clock. This service will give the Burling ion a daylight train from Chicago to Omaha, since the fast mail will carry passengers, although this feature will be entirely incidental, since the train is de signed primarily for the purpose of transporting the mail.

Incidental to this service there will be a slight change in the time of the Burlington's night train from Omaha to Lin coln, connecting with the westbound train for the coast and the Black Hills. At present this train leaves Omaha at 9:30 p. m. On and after Sunday its hour of departure from Omaha will be 9 o'clock.


