

MAKES HIS LAST SPEECH

Governor Roosevelt Brings Campaign to Close at Oyster Bay.

REPUBLICAN VICTORY TODAY FORECASTED

Candidate Says That if Croker Were to Walk Over Jackson's Grave 'Old Hickory' Would Turn Over in Disgrace.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Governor Roosevelt wound up the republican national campaign by delivering an address at Oyster Bay, L. I., before one of the largest gatherings that ever assembled at that place.

William Howard, president of the McKinley and Roosevelt club of Oyster Bay, presided over the meeting. When the governor appeared he was greeted by long and continued applause. He spoke in part as follows:

"I am a campaigner. I have not only appeared in my speeches to republicans, but to all who have the honor and integrity of the country at heart. I have appeared to higher motives than partisanship. I have appeared to all who desire to stand by their country. I have appeared to the teachings of Jefferson and Lincoln and of Lincoln.
