More personal work was done during the last two days than previously during campaign, most candidates giving time their home constituency. Neither committeee has any changes to make in its estimates. McKinley will carry the state, but the republican state ticket will get smaller vote, though apparently the state is safely republican. An increase of 10, 000 or 12,000 votes will make the majority rather uncertain. A big fight is being made here for members of the state senate holding over until after the next sens torial election.

Ohio True to McKinley. CINCINNATI, Nov. 5.—On the day before election there are no indications of radical changes in Ohio over 1896, with which year the Ohio returns will tomorrow night be compared. Four years ago the republicans in Ohio had a plurality of 51,109 over the democrats and 48,494 over Bryan as the candidate of both the democrats and the populists. Bryan is on only one ticket in Ohio this year. It is conceded that the democrats will make gains in Cincinnati and in other cities, but the republicans claim equally large gains in the rural dis-

Both Parties Claim Washington. SEATTLE, Nov. 5 .- The work of the ampaign has been closed and both the republicans and democrats claim a complete victory in the state. The republicans have announced the complete figures of the poll of 551 out of 1,031 precincts in the state, which gives them a majority of 7,757 over the entire opposition. The remaining precincts it is claimed will give them over 12,000. The democrats refuse to announce their poll, but say Bryan will carry the state by 10,000 and that the entire state ticket from governor down will go in by over 15,000 majority.

In the State of the Steel Toothpick. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 5 .- Tonight the democratic managers are confident Bryan will carry Arkansas in tomorrow's election by a majority almost equally as great as that of 1896, when the figures exceeded 72,-600 on a democratic and populist fusion ticket. In the present contest the middleof-the-road populists have nominated one elector. The democrats are making strong efforts to get out the full party vote. The republicans give the state to Bryan, but will not concede over 40,000 plurality.


