The market started firm and 6612 points higher on energetic buil speculation and a scare of room shorts based on much better English cables and a lighter forward move-ment of the crop than predicted. Claims of higher spot prices in the south helped to undermine the position of shorts and brought in buying from the outside. At the best level of the morning prices were liftid points net above last night's close. But soon after midday the market became weak and irregular under hurried sales of ingree blocks of long cotton and pounding by room bears. Not only was the forenoon improvement wiped out, but a slight net loss was scored before the selling move-ment. The bears made the most of rumors that the czar was dead. So far as southern estimates for tomorrow's receipts were concerned, the buils had the advantage.
