SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Dec. 2 .- A terrible wreck, in which a score of persons was A. G. The place time both trains were running thirty miles an hour. One of the trains had on board a construction crew numbering 150 men. The other was a freight train of fifty-five empty cars. Three engines and about forty cars were piled up forty feet high. Two Americans, train employes, were forced to flee to avoid being lynched. The names of the killed and injured are not obtainable. This is said to be the most serious wreck

that has ever occurred in Mexico. EL PASO, Tex., Dec. 2.-Details of the collision on the Mexican Central are meager. Engineer Ross and Fireman Reeves and Harveson of the frieght train were killed. Most of the dead and wounded were Mexicans, who were riding in the cars next to the engine. It is now said the collision was on the main line near Jimuleo between a freight and a passenger train and that it caused the death of eleven persons and injury of twenty. The freight was a doubleheader.

Italian Lynched by Stabbing NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Frank Tuscani was niurdered at Hackensack, N. J., today and the man who slew him was then in turn stabbed repeatedly by the friends of the victim, receiving what is said cannot fall victim, receiving what is said cannot fail to be death wounds. It was practically a lynching on the part of Tuscani's friends. The man who is dying is John Gambola of Cherry Hill. Gambola and his brothers, James and Solomon, came to Hackensack this afternoon to visit friends and spent the afternoon in drinking wine. By even-ing the dozen or more men were in a highly heated condition. heated condition.

A quarrel arose and Gambola stabbed Tiscani twice in the neck, the latter dying in a few minutes. Some of Tuscani's friends then started to take Gambola to jail, but on the way there they went to an unfrequented part of the town and stabbed him in a frightful manner. Four Italians were afterward arrested.
