

Then, as closing-up time approached, it was agreed between the brothers-in-law that Schill should open up the saloon for cleaning-out purposes Sunday morning. With this end in view the young men decided to sleep in the adjoining rooming house. This

was at 12:30 o'clock Sunday morning. Six hours later H. W. Barnabe, who occupied an adjoining room, detected the odor of gas and began an investigation. He traced the fumes to room No. 1. As the door was not locked he entered and found Kroft lying on the floor beside the bed. Schill, fully dressed, save that his shoes were off, lay upon his back on the coverlid. The sas jet was turned squarely on and both w'udow and transom were closed.
