SPRING WEATHER IN WINTER While Residents of Other Cities Wade Through Snow, Omahans Sit by

Windows and Fan Themselves. in temperature, the thermometer for the fice, 1402 Farnam Street, first time in ten years during the month of December reaching 63 degrees. The day was phenomenal in its spring-time warmth and men worked in the open air in shirt sleeves. In the homes and offices furnaces and steam boilers were closed

down and windows were thrown open. This temperature is not unprecedented in Nebraska in December, nor is 63 degrees the highest point reached by the mercury. In 1899 the high record was established, which, in the records of the weather bureau, has never been equalled. Decemher 10 of that year the thermometer reached 71 degrees. December 24, 1889, was the warmest Christmas eve in the history of the bureau, the thermometer that day reading 68 degrees. Other warm December days were in 1894, with 61 degrees on the 20th; 1893, with 60 degrees on the 23d. and 1821, with 60 degrees on the last day of the year. The coldest December day was in 1884, when the thermometer stood at 17 below zero on the 22d.
