

COUNCILMEN WIN A ROUND

Long Drawn Out Legal Skirmish with the Board of Education.

COURT SUGGESTS AMICABLE SETTLEMENT

Judge Fawcett Says it is Unnecessary to Enforce Existing Decree if School Board Takes Advantage

of Other Means to Collect.

In response to an order to show cause why the mayor and city council should not raise \$159,000 to meet the deficiency of the Board of Education, as ordered by the court more than a year ago, City Attorney Connell appeared before Judge Fawcett yesterday and removed his clients from any immediate danger of being cited for contempt by explaining that there is more than

one way of skinning a cat. Carl Herring, counsel for the Board of Education, was also present and endeavored to put the mayor and councilmen in a deep hole. He insisted upon the en-forcement to the letter of the decree of the court directing the mayor and council to raise and pay over to the Board of Education the lump sum of \$159,000, regardless of the fluancial needs of the board. He said it was a clear case of the mayor and council refusing to obey the decree of the court and urged that something be done to compel them to include in the tax levy to be made next month an item to cover the

\$159,000 due the Board of Education. City Attorney Connell argued that there was no desire on the part of the mayor and council to defy the court, but an honest intent to carry out the order in spirit. He stated that since the court had ordered the payment of the \$159,000 to the Board of Education the law had been amended so as to give the board the absolute power to fix the amount of taxes in mills to be levied for its use, and that under the present statute the council must include in its tax levy whatever number of mills the school board demands.

Power Vested in Board. This power, argued the city attorney, goes to the Board of Education with attending responsibility, and it was the duty of the school directors to make the burden of the taxpayers as light as possible. Perhaps the board is not at present in need of the whole of the \$159,000 and could get along with 25, 50 or 75 per cent of the amount, and if so it should ask for a levy of only a sufficient number of mills to cover its immediate needs. If the board needed the entire amount, it could secure it without enforcing the existing order of the court, but by merely adding to the levy to be made for its current expenditures a sufficient number of mills to cover the \$159,000, and the mayor and council would be required by the statutes to grant such a de

mand. Mr. Herring replied that it was not for Mr. Connell nor for the court to determine the amount of money needed by the Beard of Education. That was a matter to be attended to by the board itself and it did not properly belong to the case under argu-All that the board was now demanding was to have a valid decree of the court carried out. The validity of the de-

cree had not been questioned. Remarks of the Court.

Judge Fawcett disposed of the hearing by saying: can't be cleared up without any further quibbling between the mayor and council and the Board of Education. Some months ago the Board of Education represented to this court that it had a deficiency that must be met by taxation and on proper showing I issued an order requiring the cover the deficiency and pay it over to the

board. This order has not yet been complied with and is still in force. "Now, the Board of Education may undethe law certify to the city council that it requires a levy of so many mills to meet its expenditures and obligations and the council must levy the tax so demanded. I don't see any reason why the board cannot in clude in its estimate for this year a sufficient number of mills to cover this sum of \$159,000 or any part of it that may be needed. If the board desires the public to know that this additional levy is made for it at this time to cover a deficiency created under a former board and not for any increase in current expenses it may so state it in the items of the tax levy. If the board proceeds in this way it can get its money in the near future. If it does not attain the desired end by this method, then I will enforce the order of the court di-
