Southern Pacific Deal Dominates Affairs on Wall Street.

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—The stock market was under the influence of the news of the purchase of control of the Southern Pacific by a syndicate in the interests of the Union Pacific. Notwithstanding the plain corroboration by the tape on Friday of the rumors of the 'deal' the speculators were not without doubts and the official admission after the market had closed on Friday found the street in a state of unpreparedness, for while rumors of deals have been thick for many weeks past this particular one had not been formulated, even in the formation of the fipsters.

The natural consequence was a large and excited demand for stocks at the opening today. As a result of the accumulation of buying orders in commission officers since last friday there were wide openings in various stocks under the excited bidding of competing brokers. This was the main question under discussion yesterday morning at the meeting of the Board of Public Works which was called to discuss the best means of disposing of the four inches of snow which covers the Omaha streets.

City Comptroller John N. Westberg urged that the Leans of snow which are thrown from car tracks by sweepers block the streets unnecessarily and that the company should be requested to level the piles. City Engineer Rosewater suggested that it would be better to require the company to remove entirely from the streets the ridges produced by sweepers. The discussion ended in the adoption of the following reso-

Resolved. That the street car company be requested to level the ridges of snow thrown from its tracks.

Work is in Progress.

Several street cleaning gangs have been put to work and the snow is being hauled from the business section of the city as rapidly as possible. Mr. Westberg objected to this method of disposing of snow and urged that it is too expensive. He suggested that the snow be removed only from the street intersections and that it be leveled on the main streets and allowed to
