Then came the conference and the determination to wreck a joint immediately. Surrounded by half a dozen women, al! armed with natchets, Mrs. Nation led the way down Kansas avenue. She was followed by thousands of people, who tramped behind and before her in the deep snow, shouting like a mob. Mrs. Nation had no hatchet. She stopped at a store and bought one. Mrs. Nation had warned the proprietors she would raid the place if they did not stop selling liquors and they were prepared for the attack. The hatchet was jerked from her band by a stout man and the women were breed back. A fierce fight followed between the restaurant men and Mrs. Nation's defenders.
