CHICAGO, March 19.-After holding steady most of the day the wheat market ward the end of today's session broke on liquidation and closed 4c under yesterday

NEW YORK, March 19.—Today's speculation in stocks continued to show great animation and additional breadth. The leaders operated in great confidence, owing to yesterday's demonstration of the cagerness of the outside world to participate. The noots made up of professional traders therefore had little difficulty in attracting an effective following in any stock in which they chose to operate by actively bidding up prices as an excitement.

The speculative pools were also very actively engaged in taking profits all day, skilfully chosing the moment while they were developing new points of strength to sell stocks in which the advance had already been achieved, either earlier in the day or on some previous day. The result was a tombiling of prices that looked for a time like demoralization on the part of the buils. 
