NEW YORK, April 2.—Dun's review of April 6 will say:
Reports show commercial failures of 3,535 in the first quarter of 1901, against 2,894 last year. In amount of liabilities there appears a decrease, the figures this year being \$31,700,486, compared with \$33,022,573 in 1900.
Manufacturing disasters were 710 in number and \$12,504,322 in amount, against 578 last year for \$13,462,553.
In trading concerns defaults numbered 2,488, with an indebtedness of \$14,552,906, compared with 2,196 last year owing \$16,318,-617.

In the other commercial classes, includ-In the other commercial classes, includ-In the other commercial classes, includ-ing real estate, brokerage and transport-ing failures, there appears the only in-crease in amount, 157 firms defaulting for \$4,646,356, against 120 for \$3,301,373 in 1990. The most marked improvement over last year is in the banking class, where 21 fail-ures for \$3,441,389 are contrasted with 17 for \$23,651,482 a year ago.


