

DROPS DEAD WHILE TALKING

Dr. George McLaughlin, Formerly a Resident of Omaha.

BANK CASHIER FOR YEARS IN TEKAMAH

Prominent in Masonic Circles and a Member of St. John's Chapter—Body to Be Brought to Nebraska.

Dr. George McLaughlin, formerly of Omaha and Tekamah, dropped dead in New York yesterday. Dispatches received in this city state that Dr. McLaughlin was talking to friends in the parlor of their home when he suddenly expired. The coroner hastened to the house, accompanied by physicians, but their services were futile. It was found that Dr. McLaughlin's death was due to heart disease.

REWARD FOR TILLER'S ARREST

Chief Donahue Insists Sergeant Dempsey is Entitled to It Rather Than Postolme.

Saturday ended the sojourn of Prentice Tiller in Omaha. Late Saturday afternoon, in custody of Deputy United States Marshal Moore and Police Sergeant Dempsey, and in company of his pal, George H. Grant, the notorious postoffice robber started on his trip to Cincinnati.

A report is current that the \$1,000 reward offered for Tiller's arrest will be claimed by the postoffice inspectors, though the arrest was made in Omaha by Sergeant Dempsey, then a detective. Chief Donahue said last night he had not heard of any attempt on the part of the inspectors to claim the reward. He believes Dempsey is entitled to the reward and can see no reason why anyone else should make a claim. In any event, the money will not be paid until Tiller is convicted and then the federal authorities will decide who is entitled to it.

Saturday morning Judge Munger wrote out an order for the transfer of the two men to Cincinnati. It was observed that Tiller's name on the order was spelled "Tillis," and that it was followed by a parenthetical note to the effect that his real name was unknown. This is false! Unfortunately for Tiller, however, the post-office inspectors of the country are better posted.

He filed an appeal bond and was released. After he had gained his liberty he reopened his saloon, which had been closed by the police until a hearing to annul his license could be had before the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners. Achatz was arrested again Saturday evening by Patrolman Reilly and Emergency Officer Reigelman, acting under orders from Chief Donahue, and the saloon was locked up for the second time.

Storm Lake, Ia., April 6.—(Special.)—The final session of the Iowa State Conference of Charities and Correction was Friday afternoon. There was a paper by Hon. L. S. Coffin of Fort Dodge, Ia., on the projected home for ex-convicts at Fort Dodge, a reading of Governor Lathrop's address on the "Prevention of Crime," by Judge L. G. Kinne, and election of those officers: President, Prof. Isaac A. Loos of the state university, Iowa City; first vice president, Superintendent W. P. Chevalier, Red Oak; second vice president, Mrs. J. H. Hollister, Sioux City; secretary, Miss Charlotte Oak; treasurer, H. S. Hollingsworth, Des Moines; executive committee, C. D. Van Vechten of Cedar Rapids, L. O. Kinne, chief of correction, Des Moines, H. E. Shippard of Drake university, Des Moines.

France has a formidable force at Pao Ting Fu and Cheng Ting Fu, consisting of a squadron of the picturesque Chasseurs d'Afrique, two battalions of zouaves, one mountain and two field batteries, a battalion of line infantry and a battalion of marine infantry. At the capital are stationed a battalion of the Seventeenth and six battalions of the Eighteenth Marine infantry, a detachment of Chasseurs d'Afrique, two mountain batteries and a field battery. Tien Tsin holds six companies of French line infantry, a mountain battery, a field battery, two battalions of the Sixteenth marine infantry regiment and a company of engineers. At Yang Tsun are a battalion of zouaves, a squadron of Chasseurs d'Afrique and two field batteries. The lines of communication between Pekin, Tien Tsin and Pao Ting Fu are guarded by marine and line infantry, zouaves and engineers.
