Dr. McLaughlin was a brother of W. R. McLaughlin, superintendent of the Barber Asphalt company in Omaha. His sisters lived with him in New York. He was about 30 years of age.

REWARD FOR TILLER'S ARREST

Chief Donahue Insists Sergeant Dempsey is Entitled to It Rather Than Postal Men.

Saturday ended the sojourn of Prentice Tiller in Omaha. Late Saturday afternoon, in custody of Deputy United States Marshal Moore and Police Sergeant Dempsey, and in company of his pal, George H. Grant, the notorious postoffice robber started on his trip to Cincinnati. There he will stand trial for looting street mail boxes in the Ohio city on March 5.

A report is current that the \$1,000 reward offered for Tiller's arrest will be claimed by the postoffice inspectors, though the arrest was made in Omaha by Sergeant Dempsey, then a detective. Chief Donahue said last night he had not heard of any attempt on the part of the inspectors to claim the reward. 





PEKIN, April 6 .- The meeting of the generals of the allied troops and Count von Waldersee this morning was of great interest and importance, though it was known beforehand what had practically been decided upon. Still the meeting showed conclusively the attitude of the differeta powers. The only dissentents from the plan adopted were General Chaffee, the American commander, and General Wogack. commander of the Russian forces, who both thought that the number of points to be

occupied was excessive and also that the number of troops was too great. The other generals were unanimous in the opinion that nine points should be occupied between Pekin and Shan Hai Kwan, with 16,000 men exclusive of the 2,000 in Pekin. This will be a permanent measure,

while the reduction of the present forces will be made with regard to the wishes of the various governments. The railway between Pao Ting Fu and Pekin will not be guarded, it not being a line of com-75
