Similar in Many Respects to the Lipton Challenger for Amer-. /ca's Cup.

LONDON, April 6.—When Sir Thomas Lipton recently said that he was chiefly concerned about the Herreschoff boat and saw no reason to count seriously on the chances of the Crowninshield defender, he was merely echoing the opinion then generally held of Irish yachtsmen. It is now, however, dawning on the experts that the Lawson boat is worthy of more attention than was previously given to it.
