ENGINEERS AND FIREMEN GET RAISE

Telegraphers and Train Hands Receive Only Promise of Increased Pay When They Produce Proof of Unfair Scale.

NEW YORK, April 13 .- It was appounced by officials of the Central railroad of New Jersey this evening that the company had come to an agreement with its engineers and firemen. The conference which brought about this result was held between representatives of the employes of the road and General Superintendent O. L. Hausen

and Division Superintendent Wentz. The wages of the engineers and firemen were increased, but the telegraphers and train hands did not fare so well. The former were told that they will be treated as liberally as their fellow-workers in the employ of other railroads and that the train hands are to have another conference with the officials.

After the conference Timothy Shea, representative of the firemen in Jersey City, announced that there would be no strike on the New Jersey Central road. He said that had been definitely decided upon. Wyoming Oil Lands.

The Interior department has dismissed the home of Mrs. Hoffman in two weeks. the protests against the withdrawal from public entry of twenty-four townships of land in the Salt Creek oil district, Wyoming, until it can be determined whether the land is more valuable as agricultural than as oil lands. The withdrawal of these lands was ordered several months ago upon the request of owners of oil claims. A protest from stockmen and others against the withdrawal, and a request for the restitution to public entry, were recently made to the department. An examination by agents of the department was ordered, but by reason of the deep snows and bad weather, this examination has not been made. The department is determined to withhold the lands from general entry until a full examination shall establish their character. The examination will be made as soon as the weather conditions permit.

An order has been approved at the Interior department discontinuing the Sisseton (S. D.) Indian agency and placing its affairs in charge of a bonded superintendent. Agent Johnson will be advised, the agency having been abolished and his services being no longer required, to adjust his affairs so as to turn them over to the new superintendent of schools, who is expected to reach Sisseton next week. Earl T. Mc-Arthur of Osage school, Oklahoma, has been appointed superintendent of schools at Sisseton, and he will hereafter have charge of the agency affairs.
