Farmer Near Peatrice Struck by Lightning in a Corn Field.

CREIGHTON HOUSE DESTROYED BY BOL

BEATRICE, Neb., May 5 .- (Special Telegram.)--Henry Hausjurgin, whose home was two miles northwest of Pickrell, was found dead late last evening in his cornfield, where he was planting corn. His team came in from the field with the corn planter attached, an investigation was made and his body was found in the field with no marks of any kind whatever on his body except a slight singe upon his mustache. The supposition is that Mr. Hausjurgin was killed by lightning.

Kaneas City Saloons Tight Closed for First Time in Years.

BOTH OPPOSING FACTIONS KEEP BUSY

KANSAS CITY, May 5 .- Saloons in Kan sas City were closed tight today, the first time in six years. But one arrest for failure to respect Mayor Reed's order was made, and one of the quietest days for a long time was the result. Saloon men spent an active day circulating petitions to be presented to the mayor and police commis-sioners giving their side of the question and requesting a resumption of the old regime. A mass meeting under the auspices of the Law Enforcement league, attended by 500 men, was held and strong resolutions commending the mayor and police commissioners for their action adopted. It was determined to keep up the agitation for Sunday closing and a com mittee was appointed to secure evidence against saloon keepers who may fall to observe the law.


