NEW YORK, May 15—The stock market showed emphatic symptoms of relief late today and recovered vigorously from its carly acute depression, rising strongly over last night's level and establishing substantial net gains in the majority of stocks. At one time during the day prices had declined in a fairly sensational manner, the losses from last night's level extending from 3 to 10 points in a large number of important stocks.
