CATCH WITH COLD FINGERS

Omaha Players Are Unable to Play Ball with Numb Pains.
BLEAK DAY IS NATURAL TO COLORADOANS

Denver Team Prove Too Prompt and Speedy for Omaha's Men in First Game—Both Pitchers Do Good Work.

A few of the faithful shivered through the opening game with Denver down at the Vinton street reservation. It was entirely too cold for comfort and all of the ball players were about frozen up. The Denverites, used to playing ball in a rigorous climate, were the victors, the score being 2 to 0.

Gordon, the collegian, occupied the box for the locals and pitched a splendid game. In the first inning the score which the visitors appropriated was through no fault of his and should never have been chalked up. Mober, the first man up, batted an easy one down to have Calhoun and Davey grasped it in his mitt. But before he threw it over to first he tumbled all over himself, sprawling full length on the soft diamond, and Mober made first safely. Radcliffe followed with a little fly over near second base, which in nice cases out of ten would have been nabbed by Toman, but the little short-stop wasn't around, and so it was a hit.

Bradley tried for a sacrifice and bunted the ball down to Gordon. The pitcher tried to cover to Calhoun, in an attempt to catch Mober at third, but Gordon worked a little slide and to make matters worse, Calhoun threw miserably to first. Before the ball was recovered Mober had scored. Radcliffe advanced to third and Bradley to second.

Pitcher Gordon Perseveres.
This was pretty discouraging for Gordon, but he pitched fine ball, nevertheless, and struck out Holland. Hickey batted a wee grounder to Gordon and the pitcher fired it home, where Radcliffe was nabbed. Lewis flew out to Stewart and the agony was over.

But that one tally in the first inning was enough to do the business. Not once during the whole course of the struggle were the locals able to score. Eyer was libber with free passes, at that, but ineffectual batting and miserable base running cost Omaha the game.

It wasn't such a bad game, though, after all. The Omahaes fared beautifully. Calhoun's two misuses and a bad throw by Gordon to first in an attempt to catch Lewis napping in the fourth were more than offset by the spectacular fielding of Hobbs Carter and Tommy Letcher out in left and right cauliflower patches. Each of those young hoopers grabbed up long flies which looked like certain hits and saved Mr. Gordon's record by several hits.

Twirlers Divide Honors.
Eyer and Gordon divided honors in their pitching performances. The latter was a bit nervous, for it was his first whole game, but he carried himself splendidly and proved beyond a doubt that he possesses more than ordinary merit as a twirler.
