Having Postmasters Appointed Over His Head Because of

WASHINGTON, June 20 .- (Special Telegram )-Marvin Hughitt, president of one of the greatest railroad properties in the the office of the solicitor for the treasury. M. D. O'Connell of Iowa, today, waiting for the sale of the Sloux City & Pacific to take Mr. Hughitt were officials of the Northwestern system from New York and Chicago Shortly after noon, the hour set for the room and the solicitor read the advertisement. Secretary Gage then told about the act under which a commission of three was created to sell the property, against which the government holds a large lien. He spoke of the minimum price agreed upon by the commission, \$1,872,000, subject to a first mortgage of upward of \$2,000,000. which the purchasers would have to include

in the purchase price. Bids were invited, but only one appeared, a certified check of \$1,000,000 being read as coming from the Chicago & Northwestern officers, they bidding \$1,\$72,000 for the property.

Little interest was manifested and the secretary, turning to Marvin Hughitt, said 'Is this the only bid I am to receive? There was silence in the room. Hughitt officials of the Northwestern company drummed on the table.

"Well, if there is no more money, guess I will take the amount in sight. said Secretary Gage. "According to the terms of the sale you will have twenty days n which to pay the government's lien the property, Mr. Hughitt," said Mr. Gage.

"I will pay the amount tomorrow, if possible," was the reply of the president, and the sale was announced as consummated. The total price received by the government is \$2,112,000, this being the upset price decided upon by the government, and which included a credit of \$250,000 due the company for mail transportation.

Mr. Hughitt, when asked whether it was the intention of the new company to in crease its railroad facilities at Sioux City. which has been promised repeatedly should the responsible officers of the company would say. Mr. Hughitt and his party returned to New York after the sale.




